- Mission:
 - Help meet essential needs of neighbors in community without regard to race, gender, creed or sexual orientation
- Partnered with Lovin' Spoonfuls and opened Lifeboat Food Pantry on October 21, 2017
- Provides nutritious and healthy food every Thursday from 5pm-7pm for those experiencing food insecurity in the neighborhood.

- Lifeboat Food Pantry will continue to serve our neighbors who are food insecure during these uncertain times.
- We have modified our services offering fresh, pre-bagged food in a door-dash format and extended our hours to adhere to social distancing guidelines.

Personal Experiences - Nick Lozoponi

- 6 Visits (3-5pm, 5-7pm)
- Volunteer Work: food preparation, pantry organization, refrigeration in the pantry, and serving food
- General Experience:
 - Great welcome back into volunteering
 - Lots of kind, dedicated people
 - Constantly improving their system to most benefit their community
 - Have to be a lot more creative and thoughtful when approaching a problem

- Advice:
 - Don't be shy, jump into it

Paper #2 - Nick Lozoponi

- Topic: Motivators & Demographics of Young, Permanent Volunteers
 - Analysis of different motivators
 - Occasional volunteers value benefits for one's own well-being more than permanent volunteers
 - Benefits for own well-being included motivators to feel less lonely and to get through one's own problems
 - Still some argument about altruism as a key motivating difference between permanent and occasional volunteers
 - Religious organizations tend to have the highest participation amongst young volunteers

- Numbers of members keep increasing
- Volunteers always welcome to help out

Paper #2 - Aarti Aswani

- Topic: Demographics and Volunteerism
 - Senior citizens facing food insecurity (retirement)
 - Demographics: those that are of mixed races and face low income
 - Women tend to face food insecurity more than men
- Volunteerism
 - Those that are facing food insecurity also devote time to volunteer
 - Usually help out with translation
 - Receive benefits for helping out
 - Have motivation to devote their time to society and give back

Recommendations for Boston Temple

- Increase marketing techniques to those around that are in need of assistance.
 - Improve online presence by increasing social media communications and establishing a website.
- Ask current members to maybe help out with preparation and translation while also receiving the benefit of getting fresh food.
- Have a more formalized roster to track when volunteers would be available
 - Better organization and efficiency
- Source food which is more aligned with seniors diets
 - High nutrients/avoid high calorie foods
