<u>Abstract:</u> I chose to write a reflection about my experience during service learning this semester. I worked at United South End Settlements (USES) focusing on financial literacy. Despite having to serve online, I really enjoyed my semester contributing to the amazing work they do at USES.

During this semester I was fortunate enough to complete service learning at United South End Settlements. Due to obvious restrictions, service learning was to be completely online and at first, I was apprehensive because in the past the thing I have enjoyed most about service learning was interacting with the partners in the organization and members of the community they were serving. I also felt that completing service learning online would not be providing any help for the organization and would be disorganized and stressful.
