- Health Concern/Focus: <u>Social isolation</u>/loneliness among older residents at senior housing facilities
- Harmful stereotypes, stigmas, and misinformation surrounding geriatric care further the issue
 - o Inaccurate focus on prolonging life over increasing current quality of life
 - Shortage of geriatric care professionals
 - o Beliefs that elderly residents are a "burden"
- Little Brothers Friends of the Elderly (LBFE) aim to alleviate these isolating feelings
- Aim to improve mental/physical health and health/tech literacy

Community Analysis: Root Causes

Root Causes of Geriatric Isolation:

- Loss: of family, friends, purpose, cognitive/physical abilities, freedom
- Shortage of healthcare workers in the Geriatric field
- Language barriers
- Stigmatization
- Decrease access to care: financial, physical, cognitive, cultural barriers



Community Analysis: Needs

- Greater social interaction, both intergenerational and among peers to reduce loneliness
- Physical activity and greater interaction with nature/green spaces to create a change of pace
- Reliable transportation services
 - Consistent transport to appointments
- Mentally stimulating activities that are accessible for all residents
 - Cater to various physical disabilities and facilitate inclusion

Assets


- Student volunteers

Constraints

- Transportation
- High risk of health issues among residents
- Language barriers





Action

Goal #1:

- Increase social interactions among residents of the apartment complex
- Increase intergenerational interactions between the residents and the volunteers

Impact

Plan: obtain multiple perspectives on the impact of LBFE through asking the program manager and team leaders.

- 3. How would you describe the overall engagement and turnout at the service sites overall? What are some methods that you have used to increase engagement?
- 4. Personally, were there any improvements that you were hoping to see in the program?

- Residents voice happiness with LBFE and appreciate the hour
 - Look forward to weekly meetings
- Appreciate the diverse activities provided to them
- Residents overall open to expressing what they want, talking about themselves and their stories
- The importance of expanding programs like LBFE

Plan for Sustaining: Taking A Note from *Being Mortal*

Suggestions for the Future:

- Potentially expand volunteer demographic beyond only college students
 - Introduce program to all age groups
 - Raises awareness about this not widely known cause

STATE OF THE **GERIATRICIAN** WORKFORCE

Geriatricians are physician experts in pioneering advanced illness care for older people, with a focus on championing interprofessional teams, eliciting personal care goals, and treating older people as whole persons.

As we live longer, access to a geriatrics-trained workforce will be key to ensuring we can contribute to our communities for as long as possible. According to the Health Resources & Services Administration, which tracks data on the workforce we need as we age, the supply of geriatricians is projected to decrease modestly between 2018 and 2030 but demand will grow more steeply.





Research shows that 30% of people 65-years-old and older need care from a geriatrician, and that each geriatrician can care for up to 700 patients. This translates to a larger demand for geriatricians—both nationally and region by region across the U.S.
